Purpose. You asked for “hard guarantees” and not just a list: explicit rights, enforceable limits on power, and practical customs proven elsewhere. This codex converts those demands into a concrete, auditable package of laws and civic norms, each labeled with the country model it is inspired by.

Scope. This is not legal advice. It is a governance design document: what must exist in writing, what must be enforceable, and what must be measurable.

Faith posture. The CSC is described as a God-fearing nation whose scripture is the Holy Bible. This document is written to preserve that identity while also protecting conscience and preventing coercion (so faith is invited, not forced).

How to read this

Each item has four parts: (1) the CSC version, (2) the country inspiration, (3) why it is vital, and (4) the cyber implementation detail - the audit trail, enforcement mechanism, or public metric that keeps it real.

Conclusion: Would I choose to live in the CSC?
